Last Sunday the church celebrated Good Shepherd Sunday. Bishop Robert Barron wrote the following reflection.

Friends, the image of God as a shepherd is a classic one in the Bible. In the book of the prophet Ezekiel, we hear that God would one day come and shepherd Israel himself. Shepherds guarded, guided, protected, and watched over their flocks—just as God guards, guides, protects, and watches over Israel. This image comes to a climactic expression in the words of Jesus: "I am the good shepherd." What precisely makes him good? A good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The good shepherd is so other-oriented, so devoted to his sheep, that he is willing to surrender his life that they might live. Sure, a good shepherd should do all that he can to protect and guide his flock, but who among us would really expect him to give his life for them? But this is precisely what Jesus does. Imagine the difference between humans and sheep; now, multiply that difference infinitely. That would give you some idea of the difference between God and humanity. And yet God is willing to lay down his life for the likes of us.

Good Shepherd, within your embrace we are safe and secure. Within your embrace we know that we are precious in your sight. Within your embrace we feel the warmth of family and belonging. Within your embrace we grow and are nurtured together as one flock, the people of your pasture under your loving care and protection. Amen




Primary News

Reception

The children have been doing some incredible learning lately. We have moved onto Phase 4 of our phonics learning and now know how to read longer words by chunking them up. We are even beginning to spell words by chunking them up in our heads and writing the correct sounds for them.

During our English lessons, we have been learning to write using finger spaces, capital letters and full stops. We have written sentences about the Three Little Pigs and been retelling the stories during role play with much happier endings for the wolf. BOOK REVIEWS


PRIMARY PHASE



Matia in year 6 read and reviewed 'A wrinkle in time' by Madeleine l'Engle.


