Prayer and Reflection

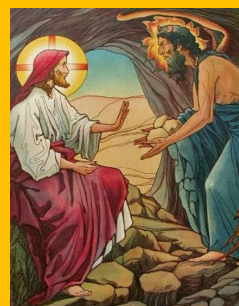

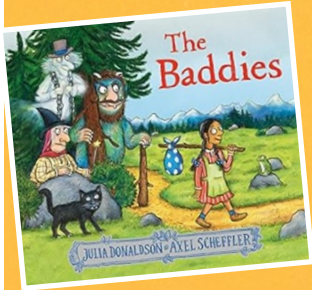


BOOK REVIEWS

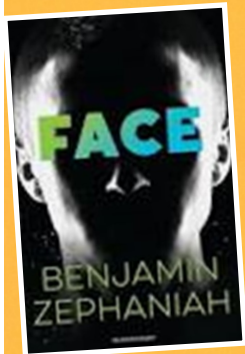


Matia in year 6 read and reviewed 'The Snow Girl' by Sophie Anderson.

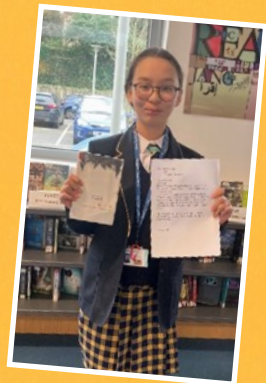


Enkhlen in year 7 reviewed 'Face' by Benjamin Zephaniah.
